<u>YOU</u> lose. You will lose hundreds and maybe thousands of dollars. You are responsible for every check deposited into your account. If that check comes back as a forgery, stolen, or fake in some other way, you owe that money to the bank.

Criminals are on social media every day trying to get young adults to use their bank accounts to cash checks. They tell all kinds of stories to make you think they are legit. They confuse you and convince you everything is okay. Then, when you give them the cash, they leave. And you are left holding the bag.

Do NOT take a check from anyone you do not personally know. They may give you a great story, but it is just that, a story, not the truth. They are using you to steal from banks and credit unions. And you end up owing the money and facing jail.

Stay away from "work" that sounds easy. Build wealth and financial independence through hard work, long hours, and honest dealings.
