Your personal information could be sold to other scammers who will send out "phishing" emails or "smishing" texts to lure you into clicking on a link or sending them money. Some survey scammers will send you an "advance fee," check, which they tell you to cash. Then, you are instructed to send back some money. Of course, the check is counterfeit and you are out the total amount of the check.

There are some legitimate online survey companies. They offer you rewards points which you can exchange for gifts once you accumulate enough points. All for telling them what you think. What a great deal!

When you sign up to give your opinions and thoughts to online survey companies, you also have to give them your personal information. Of course, they will want your email address, so they can communicate with you. They will want your phone number to communicate with you, too. And, they will want your name, to make their communications personal and human. They will need your address so they know where to ship the "rewards" you earn. Having your address tells them what part of the world you are in, to help them understand regional differences in opinions. They will all ask for your date of birth, too. They will say that helps them understand in the opinions of different age people.

Think about all the personal information you are giving that company: Your name, address, birthday, phone number. You are also telling them all the things you like and don't like. That company, and everyone who works for it, will know everything about you. They may know you better than you know yourself.
